I. Is All War Immoral?

- A. Then God would be immoral for commanding some battles and controlling their outcomes.
 - 1. God is called a "man of war" and is always victorious (Exod 15:1–12).
 - 2. God has used some nations to judge other nations (Joel 3:9–10; Amos 4:10).
 - 3. God gave permission for Israel to drive out the people of the land (Num 33:50–53).
 - 4. God declares war on the wicked as preparation for the peace of the Kingdom (Rev 6, 19).
- B. Then godly men who engaged in war weren't godly.
- C. Then church leaders missed an opportunity to teach against it.
- D. Then protecting innocent lives from bloody dictators is wrong.

II. Should Christians Go to War?

- A. There are too many factors in war than can be settled with a "just war" position.
- B. Serving one's country can be seen as "being in subjection to the governing authorities" (Rom 13:1–4; 1 Pet 2:13–14).
- C. Serving in the military can be viewed as serving God and protecting the threatened.

- D. Serving in war does not violate Scripture.
- E. Praying during war is the responsibility of every believer.

- 2. War is sometimes necessary.
- 3. The Christian is to "fear God and honor the emperor" (1 Pet 2:17).
